







Intelligent artificial limbs distributed to Divyangs at Agartala

Intelligent artificial limbs have been distributed among 21 Divyangs of the state through a programme organized at the DDRC office premises on October 4. Health Minister Sudip Roy Barman handed over these artificial limbs to the beneficiaries.

Inaugurating the programme organized by ONGC Tripura Asset in joint collaboration with District Disability Rehabilitation Centre (DDRC) and Green Tech Foundation of Delhi, Health Minister Sudip Roy Barman appreciated the initiative taken by ONGC Tripura Asset to mitigate the problems of Divyangs of the state. He stated that under this programme intelligent artificial limbs will be distributed among 71 Divyangs in a phased manner. These intelligent artificial limbs are being distributed among those who had lost their important limbs in accident so that they could be able to move around to some extent by utilizing these artificial limbs. He also stated that for prevention of Malaria, the health department and ONGC Tripura Asset will work together more aggressively to generate awareness. He sought for cooperation of all in this work. The Asset Manager of ONGC, Tripura G.K. Singha Roy stated that ONGC is committed to the development of Tripura. ONGC always extends cooperation to the people of Tripura for such type of social activities. The Chairperson and CEO of Green Tech Foundation K. Saran, Member-Secretary of DDRC Dr. Dipti Bikash Roy also appreciated this initiative.

Ongoing programmes for farmers' interest in Hezamara

In the interest of farmers Hezamara agri-subdivision is implementing a number of programmes. Among such programmes, one is Sub-Mission Agricultural Mechanisation Scheme under which 22 power-tillers have been distributed at subsidized rate among the farmers of Hezamara block during the current financial year. On the other hand, under Soil Health Card scheme soil sample of 210 farmers' land has been tested. Under the Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana land of 400 farmers of the block has been covered. Agricultural supervisor Ajit Debbarma has informed this.

51 health camps in 7 days held in Dhalai district

With a view to reaching out to the people of remote areas with health facilities, a total of 51 health camps have been organized in various villages under Dhalai district from 24 September to 30 September by the CMO office of Dhalai. After necessary health check-up a total of 1,727 patients were treated in those health camps. Among them 724 patients were suffering from fever. Rest of the 1003 patients were having different diseases. Blood sample of patients suffering from fever were tested in those health camps. Among them, 52 patients have been diagnosed with malaria parasite in their blood.
